
People fundamentally ifferent. Each person is a unique individual with his or her own natural strengths and preferences. These individual gifts or bents are called learning



styles. One of the most effective models for understanding learning style differences comes from the research of Dr. Anthony F. Gregorc. His model provides invaluable insights into how our minds perceive and understand information. These learning styles are most distinct in childhood. As we mature, these distinctions blur as we learn to adapt to the needs and learning styles of others. Therefore, it is harder to draw distinct lines in determining our own learning styles or those of other adults.

Why are we interested in learning styles when we are not teachers? Our church is made up of people with different personalities, gifts, and learning styles. It is helpful to know and understand what motivates them, what leads them to react as they do, and what makes them feel comfortable. We do not want someone who believes that emotions should be justified by facts in charge of benevolence. So, knowing learning styles helps us understand the complex personalities in our congregation and informs us how individuals work best and feel most comfortable.

Over the next months we will discover four different learning styles. But before we start, here is a quiz developed by Cynthia Tobias to see if you can discover your own learning style, the learning style of your spouse, children, or grandchildren.

Lafayette Transitional Housing (LTHC) provides a variety of services for the homeless and low-income families in our area. They work with other services to connect the homeless with community resources and housing services and to provide appropriate housing solutions. Specialists and case managers work with participants to provide direction and solutions.

In some situations permanent, supportive housing is provided in rental units throughout the community with access to local bus routes and necessary services.

Services include homeless services, permanent supportive housing programs, supportive services for Veteran families, rapid re-housing programs. LTHC provides phone/mail service, shower/laundry facilities, day sleep rooms, three meals a day, gas vouchers, bus tokens, and other services.

One of the program aims is to provide housing while participants address other needs, such as mental and physical health issues, education and employment needs, and transportation. Another goal is to move clients out of shelters or unstable situations into their own housing. LTHC promotes housing stability among very low-income Veteran families in a seven-county area.

LTHC is a United Way agency and is able to provide their variety of services with the aid of many donations and volunteers. They do not accept used clothing or televisions; however, they can accept many types of donations, such as housewares and personal items. A list of needed items can be found on their website www.lthc.net/get-involved/needed-items. How cash donations can help:

\$30 will house a homeless child for two nights.

\$50 can provide direct financial assistance to a homeless mother.

\$100 provides a homeless family with heat.

There are a variety of ways groups and individuals can volunteer at LTHC. Suggestions are available on the web site or one can visit the facility at Howarth Center, 615 N 18th St., Suite 102, Lafayette, IN 47904, phone 765-423-4880

East Tipp Baptist Church provides assistance to LTHC in two ways. Each quarter we prepare and serve a meal to accommodate 50-70 people. Twice a year we collect items that are of special need at the time.
